Description

Castle Hill, a natural mound, was used in the construction of a mound and bailey castle. traces of the bailey can be seen to the east and much medieval pottery has been found on the site <1e>

The mound is very large, 25ft high on the west and rising steeply from the pool...it has been adapted from a sandy glacial mound. The d itch on the N,W and S is 10-12ft wide. An ice house has been built (into it)..The top is flat, indented here and there with canine graves. The diameter at the bottom is 80ft, at the top 25ft. There are no traces of masonry associated with the mound, nor any traces of a bailey as cottages now cover the area noted in 1930, when much C13 medieval pottery was found (now in Shrewsbury Museum). The site is known traditionally as Ethelred's Castle <1f>
The icehouse is situated in the ESE scarp of the motte <1g>

Ice house. C18. Red brick. Barrel-vaulted entrance passage leading to domed central chamber. No door at time of survey (June 1986). The ice house has been built within a motte (County A.M. no. 273) <2>

Scheduling affirmed in 2001. Scheduling description: ->

- -> The monument includes the earthwork and buried remains of a motte castle and an 18th century icehouse, situated to the north west of Pool, House. The castle is believed to have been the principal holding (or caput) of a Norman lord in the manor of Eldredelei (Alderley) and in the early 12th century was held by the Dunstanvill family. A roughly circular steep-sided glacial mound about 7m high has been adapted and used to form the motte. It is surrounded by undulating land and is approximately 65m in diameter at its base and 35m across the top. The summit of the motte is flat, but rises gradually from the north west to the south east. Quarrying for sand in modern times has modified the eastern and western parts of the motte, which in the early 20th century resulted in the discovery of sherds of 13th century pottery and part of a rim of a bronze cauldron. These artefacts are attributed to the final period of occupation of the castle. They appear to have been associated with a charcoal rich deposit and burnt soil, suggesting that the structures on top of the motte were burnt down. The top of the motte has been used as a dog cemetery. Three in situ grave slabs all date to around 1930. ->
- -> In the 18th century a brick-built icehouse was inserted into the south eastern side of the mound. A barrel-vaulted entrance passage, 5.5m long, leads to a domed ice-chamber, approximately 3m in diameter. This type of icehouse is known as a cup and dome ice well. The lower part of the mound was dug away to form a platform for unloading and loading ice in front of the entrance passage. Some of the earth from the construction of the icehouse was deposited to the east of the platform to form a raised track. The platform and the western end of the trackway, as well as the icehouse itself, are included in the scheduling. The icehouse probably served as the ice store for Pool House, a farmhouse of 16th or 17th century date, extensively altered and extended in the 19th century. The icehouse is a Listed Building Grade II. ->
- -> Ice was probably obtained from the pond within the narrow steep-sided valley to the south of the Pool House. The pond, which is approximately 0.6ha in area, was created by constructing a dam across the valley to the south west of the castle mound to retain the water flowing from the south east. Water levels in the pond are controlled by a sluice in the northern end of the dam. Although it seems likely that the ice was obtained from the pond, the relationship between the icehouse and the pond cannot be proven. Hence the pond is not included in the scheduling. ->
- -> The memorial stones and all fence and gate posts are excluded from the scheduling, although the ground beneath these features is included <5>

The structure is situated below Castle Hill and Castle Hill Pool, between Adderley railway station and the south union canal. It is completely underground, reported to have a depth of 20m. And is constructed of brick, stone, earth and sand with an E

facing entrance. The source of ice was the pool. <6>

Part of Adderley Churchyard cross, dug up about 1880 whilst digging a grave, is under one of the yew trees in the churchyard <1a>

No remains of a cross can now be seen under the yew trees in the churchyard. At SJ66103959 is a composite structure consisting of an old cross-base 0.7m square and 0.3m high on a float of old stones and concrete 1.2m square. A broached shaft 0.3m square and 0.7m high carries a cube of stone with 0.4m sides to which is affixed a sundial. A stone ball is fixed to the top. Local enquiries suggest that the structure h as been in its present position for a considerable time. OS FI 1975 <1>

Sundial. Probably C18. Red sandstone. Square base with 2 steps, tapered square shaft with chamfered corners, cubic dial block with wrought- iron gnomons and globe finial. It is probable that this sundial incorporates parts (e.g. the shaft) of a former medieval churchyard or village cross <2>

Moat field names on the Tithe Award map suggest a moat having once existed on the Lees, probably in the field adjacent to the N side of the farm. It is clear that the probable site of the moat has been largely destroyed and altered by the course of the railway line, now disused, but its likely site can still be made out. It appears to have been sited on a level piece of ground and to have used a natural stream course and its small valley as the N and W arms of the moat. The E arm of the moat is probably indicated by a now dry pond, which appears to have been subsequently enlarged into the area of the island. The S arm probably ran along the course of the present track leading to the farm, and was probably infilled when the railway bridge embankment was built. The moat appears to have been rectangular in shape. A probable slight dam bank is sited next to the stream course along the line of the presumed N arm-continuing its alignment on the other side of the stream is a scarp which runs NW till it is truncated by the railway line. This scarp and the dam bank are probably associated with the moat and may represent a widening of the moat ditch possibly to form a fishpond. There are no traces of building platforms or other features on the supposed area of the moat island. MD Watson FI. 1983 <1>

In 1752 the formal grounds and main approach ran south from the hall to the Adderley-Shavington road (J. Rocque, Map of Shropshire). Between 1752 and 1808 the park was more than doubled in size, to extend north to the parish boundary (south of Cox Bank) and probably east to include Adderley mere. By 1808 a large lake had been created south of the hall, the main approach to which was now from the east, from the north end of Adderley village. Lodges had been built to either side of the entrance there (R. Baugh, Map of Shropshire (1808)). Later the park was reduced. By 1833 (O.S. 1, LXXIII.NE) (the evidence of C. and J. Greenwood, Map of Shropshire (1827) is ambiguous) its extent was similar to that in 1889 (O.S. 6, XXVIII.SE), although in 1833 its north-eastern boundary was the main road north-west from Adderley, across which in 1889 the park extended to include most of the land south of Park Farm. Nave, chancel and south transept: plinth, cill band with slightly chamfered top, moulded cornice and blocking cone. Triangular-pedimented gabled ends. 2 small gabled finials on blocking course to north, marking the division between nave, crossing and chancel. Cast-iron 3-light Gothic windows with panelled tracery. South wall of transept, east and north walls of chancel and north wall of crossing with full-height recessed blank panels. Central south nave doorway with pair of doors (each with 3 beaded flush panels) and moulded surround. Square projection in angle of chancel and south transept. North (Kilmorey) chapel: chamfered plinth, coved parapet string, and battlemented parapet with moulded coping and crocketed finials at corners (N. E. missing at time of survey) and at apex of gable. North window with four-centred arch, 3 cinquefoilheaded lights with mullions continuing up into head, moulded reveals and diamond-leaded glazing. Segmentalheaded east window of 2 cinquefoilheaded lights with Y-tracery, reveals with cyma-recta moulding and diamond leaded lights. Nail-studded boarded west door with four-centred moulded archway under square head, moulded step and flight of 4 steps with rounded corners. Interior: divided at time of survey; the nave now serves as the parish church and the rest of the building has been declared redundant. Apsidal ends, to chancel and south transept. Round tower arch. Round-arched recess in south wall of chancel. Beaded flush dado panelling, ramped up to apse in south transept. Moulded cornice to flat ceiling. C12 stone font with circular base and bowl in the shape of a cushion capital with carved foliage ornament, a cross patee, addorsed volutes etc, and the inscription: "HIC MALE PRIMUS HOMO FRUITUR CUM CONIUGE POMO". Late C17 wooden altar rails with moulded base, fluted balusters with carved acanthus ornament to lower parts, and moulded rail; doubled balusters at each end. Benches of c. 1801 with beaded flush back and end panels. Hexagonal wooden pulpit of c. 1801 with 4 panels to each side, fluted band to base, fret ornament to moulded cornice, hexagonal stem with moulded base and top, and 3 steps. Screen to vestry (beneath tower) dated 1908 with raised and fielded panelling, central 4panelled door and moulded cornice. Segmental-headed C18 nail-studded door to tower in vestry. 7-bay inlaid wooden altar, probably c. 1900, with three-quarter columns. Oak chancel screen of c. 1908; 2:1:2 bays with unfluted Corinthian columns on pedestals with entablature, breaking forward in centre, crucifix above and pair of central wrought iron gates. Old oak iron-bound chest. Remains of C19 organ. South doors with large L-hinges on inside. Commandment boards flanking tower arch. Benefactors board in vestry "WILLIAM DUCKERS JOHN KEMP, CHURCH WARDENS 1826". Tablet with Creed and Lords Prayer above south door. At the time of survey (July 1986) some windows have lost their sashes or have been blocked. Late C19 and late C20 additions have been built adjoining, the west front.

John Carline the Younger (1761-1835) designed the portico (built 1787-9) of Adderley Hall (dem. And rebuilt 1877) for Sir Clive Corbet so it is possible that he was also responsible for the stable block. Adderley Hall Farmhouse is not included on this list.

Possible site of a fortified manor house at 'Warandashale', granted a license to crenellate in 1294. Evidence from a writ of 1270 might suggest that the location of this site was near Longslow, possibly at a site which retains the name 'Castle Hill'.

Description

In 1294 Richard de Peulesdon received a license to crenellate his manor house at 'Warandashale', a place name now lost, but possibly associated with Wardale at SJ 673 298, c.4km S of Market Drayton (see PRN 33923). A possible alternative site is suggested in a writ issued by Richard against Hugh de Longslow in 1270. If it assumed that Richard and Hugh were landowning neighbours, then the site of the castle may be retained in the placename of 'Castle Hill', nearer Longslow. <1>
