Scheduled Monument: A well preserved ringwork (a type of medieval stronghold defended by a bank and ditch which is relatively uncommon in Shropshire), which is particularly unusual in that its bailey (outer court) survives.

Description and Sources

Description

An earthwork revealed by tree felling, in Castlehill Wood. It was noticed in 1950 by Mr P Bentley. Opposite Buntingsdale Hall, it is a well fortified site rising out of the alluvial flat, consisting of a sandstone ridge defended by the river Tern and associated marsh on the E, SE and S sides, and on the North by a rampart with a wide external ditch. The hill top is flat, of diameter 70ft, rising 18-20ft from the ditch. A small rampart runs along the W side from the SE. ADS IAM for DOE FI 1970 <1>

Large Norman ringwork, situated at SJ65103252, incorporates, and is modelled from the upper parts of a glacial morainic mound of sandy soil and small stones. The mound sits atop steep slopes falling to a stream on the E and S but joins gently rising ground to the NW. The base diameter is about 65m and the height to the interior about 3m from the outside ground level on the W. The D shaped interior is 35m in diameter and is enclosed by a rampart, 14m to 17m in width and up to 2m in height. There is a 4m wide entrance in the S side. The NE side has been carried away by a landslip..An outer ditch, 14m in width and 1.2m in depth provides an additional defence on the weak NW side. OS FI 1975 <2>

Evaluated for MPP in 1990-1, High score as one of 43 Motte castles. <6>

Scheduling revised 2001. Scheduling description: ->

- -> The monument includes the earthwork and buried remains of a ringwork and bailey castle occupying an elevated position on a spur of land next to the steep north west valley side of the River Tern. From this commanding location there are extensive views of the land to the west and the Tern valley. ->
- -> The ringwork is D-shaped, measuring approximately 30m by 34m internally, and is defined by two ramparts, which are separated by an entrance passage 6m wide to the west. The ringwork is defined on its north eastern side by the bluff created by the adjacent river. The rampart on the southern/south western side is considerably smaller than the one to the north west. It is about 8m wide and stands just less than 1m high, becoming slightly broader and higher at its eastern end. Its defensive strength is significantly enhanced by its position at the top of a steep slope, which has been deliberately accentuated. Down the slope to the south east of this rampart, earth has been deposited to form a level projecting lookout platform, measuring approximately 11m by 16m. The rampart defining the north western side of the ringwork is about 18m wide and stands to a height of 2.5m. It is bounded on its northern side by a broad ditch, up to 19m wide, which becomes narrower towards its southern end where it defines the northern side of the entranceway into the interior. To compensate for natural slope within the ringwork the eastern part of the interior has been raised in order to create a level building platform. ->
- -> On the slight ridge to the north west of the ringwork, a bailey was constructed. Within this enclosure a range of ancillary structures are likely to have been built, including stores, stables and additional domestic accommodation. The north eastern side of the bailey, which is about 45m long, is marked by the bluff formed by the river, which has been partially steepened to increase its defensiveness. The defences constructed to define the north western and south western sides of the bailey are no longer visible at ground level, but will survive as buried features. ->
- -> All fence and gate posts, and stiles are excluded from the scheduling, although the ground beneath them is included <7>

A programme of total station theodolite (TST) analytical earthwork survey was undertaken by a number of volunteers at the ringwork and Bailey Castle (Castlehill) at Fordhall Farm (PRN 01027) under the direction of James Goodhind. The survey achieved fairly comprehensive coverage across the earthworks of the site and allowed the creation of a series of 2D and 3D models. <8>

Little survives of the presumed bailey to the north of the ringwork. The site as a whole was only re-discovered after the Second World War when it was cleared of woodland. It is described as having no known name or documentary reference, and even its history of tenure is unclear from the start. An amateur, unpublished, excavation at the site in the 1950s did

uncover dressed stone [the source of this information appears to be pers. comm. - see <11>]. <10>

This site was 'excavated' by a teacher at Market Drayton in the 1950s. No details are known of this individual or whether any record still exists. The late tenant gave information on the excavations - some sort of cobbled surface was discovered, along with stone fragments that may have been door jambs and lintels. In addition, a lot of worked sandstone is built into earlier sections of the present Fordhall Farmhouse and laid into its rockery. <11>

Description

Roman road running from Stretton (Staffs) to Whitchurch. Evidently constructed in order to cut off the unnecessary mileage in reaching Chester from Stretton by way of Wroxeter. In 1994 it was suggested at a public enquiry into a road improvement scheme at the Longford, Rosehill, that the line of the former parish boundary marks the line of the Roman Road at this point rather than the line of the current road, the A41 <3>

Evaluated for MPP in 1990-1. High score as one of 11 Roman Roads <4>

This Roman road is known as "The Longford". It was a branch from Watling Street, the main London to Wroxeter (Viroconium) road, and ran from the site of a Roman settlement at Water Eaton (Staffs) on Watling Street to Chester (Deva) via Whitchurch (Mediolanum) <5>

A trial trench located the cutting for the road at Ellerton, though no road surfaces were observed. <6>

A programme of archaeological evaluation was carried out in 1996 on land at Hinstock. Two trial trenches were excavated. The only archaeological features recorded related to a holloway running NW-SE across the site. This hollow way was interpreted as marking the line of the Roman road running through this area. A programme of survey of this feature and a watching brief across the remainder of the site was recommended. <7>

Following on from the evaluation, a programme of survey was carried out of the holloway, interpreted as representing the line of the Roman road as it crossed the site. A watching brief was subsequently carried out during the initial groundworks on site; this recorded no archaeological finds or features. <8>

Description

Sited on very gently sloping land on the S side of a gentle E/W ridge c200 m to the N. Well preserved rectangular moated site. The moat arms average c10m in width and c2m deep to the present partly waterfilled/ waterlogged level. The wet moat is used as an outlet for domestic water and drainage from the farm to the NE. This flows in at the NE corner where the SE arm has been extended northwards for the inlet... The island, which is inaccessible, measures roughly 43m x 40m, no apparent internal features can be seen on the platform. Well preserved ridge and furrow lies in the pasture field on the immediate NE side of the moat. It is orientated NE/SW (the same as the moat) with a well preserved headland along its S edge. Two pond/depressions lie on the E side of the field and appear to cut through the ridge and furrow. Sited in and surrounded by woodland except immediately to the NE, where there is a pasture field. M Watson FI 1981 <4>

Scheduling affirmed in 1999. Scheduling description: ->

- -> The monument includes the earthwork and buried remains of a medieval moated site situated in an area of gently undulating land. The moat defines an island, which measures approximately 40m north west -south east and 45m south west-north east. Material excavated from the moat has been used to raise the surface of the island by about 0.3m above the surrounding ground. The moat retains water, and the arms of the moat are between I3m and I8m wide and have an average depth on their outer sides of 1.3m. The northern part of the south eastern arm has been extended by 10m. ->
- -> The remains of a strip cultivation system (ridge and furrow) survive 40m to the north east of the moated site, but these are not included in the scheduling. ->
- -> A number of features are excluded from the scheduling, these are; all modern field boundaries, fences and gates and the drain inlets and the associated control mechanism at the north eastern corner of the site; the ground beneath all these features is, however, included <8>

Description

Moated site situated on ground gently sloping E towards R Duckow which lies c45m to the E. It is sited c2-3 m above the water level. This formerly well preserved rectangular moat is now highly degraded due to ploughing, and is only just discernible. The island, which measures c45m x60m is raised and levelled to compensate for the general slope of the ground, but at present is only 0.25m above the surrounding ground level. It has no trace of any buildings. The ditch whose E half was formerly waterfilled is c 5m wide and 0.3m deep. There is no trace of a causeway. An outer retaining bank runs around the E half of the moat, this too was formerly a substantial feature, but is now very low and degraded. M Watson FI 1981 <4>

Vague cropmark visible on vertical aerial photography. <7>

Also known as 'Warandashale'; received a license to creneallte in 1295. <8>

The site is not mentioned as being fortified at any time after 1295, so there is the possibility that the license to crenellate never led to a fortification being built although the moat (c.45m x 60m is one of the larger moated sites among a cluster around Moreton Say which would suggest that it carried some status. <9>

In his study of the Shavington's history, Henry D. Harrod traced the documentary record of 'a house' at Shavington to 1293-41. Although there must have been a house of some standing at Shavington in 1438 when Sir John Needham first leased it, it was to be fifty or so years before the first dwelling 'of considerable size' was built here. The substantial house built by Sir Robert Needham at the end of the 15th Century was all but abandoned at the outset of the Civil War, remaining disused for forty years. The state of the place was such that when he came of age in 1678 Thomas Needham, 6th Viscount Kilmorey (1658-1687), opted to build anew. The new pile of this the wealthiest of Kilmoreys was to be the largest country house built in Shropshire. It was completed in 1685. Although Shavington Hall was pulled down in 1959, there does survive a handsome documentary record of its layout and appearance in the form of drawings and photographs. <9>

The field immediately to the W of Bletchley Manor was recorded as Castle Hill on the 1840 Tithe Award Map. Shavington Hall, built for the sixth Viscount Kilmorey in 1685, was described by Pevsner as the grandest house of its date in Shropshire. It was altered in 1822, again by Norman Shaw, and finally in 1903 by Sir Ernest Newton (N. Pevsner, Shropshire (1958), 240-1). In 1959 it was demolished, and in 1994 its site lay under rough grassland. North west of the Hall lay a stables block of 1787-8 (Listed Grade II: 1573/6/6) and behind that a walled kitchen garden of c. 125 x 80 m; both escaped demolition in 1958 and still stood in 1994. ->

- -> Sections at least of the walls of the 'walled kitchen garden, not examined in detail in 1994 when it was in commercial horticultural use, appeared to be of 18thC or earlier date. ->
- -> Along the south front of the Hall, which was probably remodelled in 1885 and 1904 (dates on rainwater heads noted on photos in Local Studies Library) was a low terrace giving access down onto a formal lawn with central sun dial. A 20C air photo (Cambridge, SI. Joseph 1108/65) shows this to have at some stage to have been divided up with elaborate geometric beds. In 1994 the area of this garden remained as open flat grassland, with a slight terrace along its south side. ->
- -> A hundred metres west of that lawn, in woodland, is an interconnected series of ponds covering an area of almost 100 x 100 m, and comprising 2 1/2 (? Originally 3) north-south ponds joined together along their southern ends as are the central and eastern ponds towards their northern ends. Mr. Heywood-Lonsdale, the owner, said these were believed top be the trenches where clay was got for bricks to build the Hall. ->
- -> The west side of the Hall looked out on to the 80-metre gap between the north side of the woodland around those pools and the stables, and in the early 20C, probably soon before 1926, that view was modified by the planting up of the area beyond (previously open) as woodland while leaving two broad, straight radiating clearances as vistas through it . ->
- -> Already by 1577 the predecessor of Kilmorey's house was set in a park, and by 1752 the grounds were extensive, apparently extending as far east of the river Duckow as they did west. That arrangement probably included a formal avenue running east from the front of the Hall to a bridge across the Duckow, with a second avenue running at right-angles south from the Hall to the Big Pool (Stamper, P. Ii.. Survey of Historic Parks and Gardens in Shropshire (1993), 202-3). Study of an estate map of the mid 18th century (in the estate office at Calverhall in 1994) would no doubt allow a fuller understanding of the landscape at that time, although certain features of the map, on cursory inspection, do give rise to suspicion: notably that it appears to show a broad canal running north from the east end of Big Pool towards the Hall, ground which in fact runs up hill, and brief inspection of which revealed no trace of any such feature on the ground. ->
- -> Big Pool itself, so known from the later 19th century, was apparently earlier, c. 1840, called New Pool (Shrops. R.O., Moreton Say field name map), suggesting its modification or enlargement prior to that. Further change (a diminution of it southern extent) occurred 1840 x 1890. ->
- -> Major changes were made to the park by Francis, First Earl of Kilmorey (d. 1832); both William Emes and secondly Humphry Repton (in 1793) produced schemes for Shavington. The old avenues and the former main approach were done away with and new drives created which curved westwards up to the back of the house, these being carried across the Duckow by two new bridges. The more northerly of those bridges (both Listed Grade II: 1573/517-8) was widened in 1940 and now carries the minor road from Adderley to Wilkesley. The approach from the south may also have been modified at this time, by 1840 it being via 19C gates with a lodge (not occupied 1994) to the north, and down a straight drive (lined with mature trees in 1994) to the east end of the Big Pool, and thence to join the main drive to the Hall from the south-east. Any parkland east of the Duckow was apparently much reduced or given up. ->
- -> The park apparently had mixed fortunes in the 19C. Writing c. 1891 Leach said' that after 1839 the park was neglected, became dilapidated, and 'more of a wilderness', the rabbits alone thriving (F. Leach, The County Seats of Shropshire (1891),246). However, in 1851 the park's recent enlargement to 1,500 acres [to include land east of the Duckow] was noted along with the completion of five miles of a brick wall around its seven-mile circumference (S. Bagshaw, Directory of Shropshire (1851),258). That wall, low and red brick, remained a notable feature of the local landscape in 1994. The missing

south-eastern section of park wall, towards Tittenley, never was built (inf. From Mr. Heywood-Lonsdale). ->

-> In 1885 a pair of new lodges (both Listed Grade II: 1573/5/17-19), either by Richard Norman Shaw or W.R. Letharby, was built at Tittenley, on the south-east side of the park. By the end of the 19th century there were also lodges around the park to the north (Wilesley Lodge), north-west (Morrey Lodge), and south close to Shavington Grange Farm (the last being the above-mentioned lodge by the south entrance). ->

-> In 1994, as for many years previously, the park was managed as farmland, and arable land ran up to the site of the east front of the Hall. It was interspersed, however, with large numbers of mature parkland trees, including some notable limes.

The date of 1787-8 for the stables block, given in <2>, is considered to be problematic. Tomlinson and Emes' maps, dated 1768, show buildings in this location, which are interpreted as the satable offices, whilst Repton's map of 1792 does not show the quadrangle visible today. It is suggested that stables of c.1735 were demolished c.1822, when new quadrangular stables were laid out. See PRN 14024. <3>

A programme of building survey was carried out at the Royal Oak Farm, Bletchley in association with a programme of conversion. This provides an architectural description and provisional interpretation of the sequence of development of the farmhouse. As well as listing some of the individual features of architectural interest, the report concludes that the late 16th or early 17th century farmhouse, with later additions, is primarily the result of alternatie reconstruction of an older building.

In March 2005 a Level 2 building recording survey, followed by a watching brief was carried out at Bletchley Manor in advance of plans to make alterations to the property. Bletchley Manor is an early example of a countryside house using double pile, double gabled form, which together with its prolific use of single storey close studding indicates it was a house of some status. Internally this appears to have been somewhat let down by its lack of decoration, with decorative moulding absent from exposed ceiling beams and plain inglenook fireplaces. This was rectified in the late 17th century with the complete redesigning of two of the rooms with decorative fireplaces and panelling. Altogether five phases of construction were noted during the work, with the initial construction of the property in 1594, followed by the series of modifications in the mid-late 17th century. Although alterations were made to the windows in the northwest elevation in the 18th century, the manor remained reasonably unchanged until the early part of the 19th century when a brick built range was added onto the south-east end of the building. Further modifications and improvements were then made throughout the 20th century.->

-> Dendrochronological sampling took place in November 2004 [<5>] with eight samples taken from the first floor and the north and south roof timbers. All the timber sampled was oak, and several retained sapwood. Three of the sample pieces came from the same tree, indicating that the parallel ranges were built at the same time. The combined series of five of the timbers sampled formed a 113 year site chronology, which was dated to the period 1481-1592 by comparisons with referenced chronologies. The timbers would have been felled within a relatively short period, and the most likely date for construction of this house is therefore 1594, or within a year or two after this date.<4>

The primary build comprises two parallel 2-bay ranges, each of two storeys with an attic. The roofs have single staggered purlins and straight windbraces. The panelling is of mid-17th century style and the heraldic stained glass is dated 1639 – previously thought likely to be the date of the primary phase. <7>

C17 or C17-style dado panelling around walls. Circular red/grey sandstone font with moulded base and top and wooden cover. Wooden pulpit of c. 1900 with pierced traceried panels and carved frieze. 2 wooden eagle lecterns. Screen of c. 1900; 2:1:2 bays with linenfold lower panels, cusped pierced heads with carved spandrels, carved vine trail frieze, rosettes and brattishing; central rood cross. C20 choir stalls with carved poppyheads. Carved pelmet over west door. Stained glass: east window of c. 1900 by Kempe. Similar entrance to south with round archway and triangular pediment above. Shavington Hall was dated 1685. It stood to the south-west of the stable block and was demolished in 1959. It had been altered in 1885-6 by Richard Norman Shaw and again (internally) in 1903 by Ernest Newton. The late C19 restoration of the stable block and the additions might be the work of Shaw. The stable block still stands at the centre of a landscaped park with a number of lakes. Shavington Gardens are not included on this list. Buildings of England, p240-1; Country Life, . A conservation plan was prepared in December 2014 to inform planning for the conversion of Shavington Stables. This includes an assessment of their significance and detailed history of their development in relation to the site of the hall (PRN 01674). This history is largely constructed from documentary and cartographic sources, rather than a detailed examination of the building itself. ->

- -> The fact that no archival record has been found of the stables which served Thomas Needham's late 17th Century Hall is suggested as representing that the 6th Viscount did not build stables for his new house but instead made use of preexisting stables. These 'pre-existing' stables stood alongside the new Hall for half a century. ->
- -> The first documentary record of a stables in this location is given as 1735 (contra <2>). The 1735 built stables were ranged along the north side of a square yard on whose western side was set the Hall's 'Offices' (Laundry and Brew House), built by the 9th Viscount Kilmorey. The 9th Viscount's stables lasted less than a century, being pulled down in the early 1820s. Nothing of them remains. However, the 1735 built Offices do survive. When in c.1822 the 1735 built stables were pulled down new stables were built
- against the back (western side) of the 1735 built Offices. Constructed at the instruction of the energetic Francis, 1st Earl Kilmorey, the quadrangular arrangement of stables survived unaltered for just over fifty years. Arthur P. Heywood-Lonsdale bought the Shavington Estate in 1885 and immediately commenced an ambitious programme of works to improve both the Hall and its stables. Although much of the external fabric of the early 1820s stables buildings was retained, the modifications were extensive: Window openings were refenestrated, an upper floor was added to the north stables range, a lean-to built against the outer wall of the west stables range and all interiors were improved. In the 1735 built Offices whilst the spaces to the north of the archway were retained in use as the Laundry and Wash House, the Brew House was removed and the southern spaces converted for human habitation. ->
- -> In 1892 the construction of a new laundry in Shavington village allowed the north part of the 1735 Offices to be converted for use as stables & the Head Groom's house. In c.1910 a substantial Motor House range was built against the north wall of the quadrangle's north range. At about the same time a single storey tack room was constructed to the east of the stables' south range. ->
- -> During World War II both the Hall and the Stables at Shavington were occupied by the military. Minor modifications were made to the stables: For instance the formerly blind window openings of the north and south ranges' first floor lofts were opened up and fenestrated to provide natural light to the loft spaces used to accommodate other ranks. Shavington Hall was demolished in the late 1950s. Whilst the Stables were not demolished, the loss of the Hall spelt redundancy for such

ancilliary buildings. The building has stood derelict ever since. <6>

Oldfields Farm, Moreton Say, is an isolated farmhouse in North Shropshire with a two-bay base-cruck hall which did not date. The upper parts of the hase-cruck structure had as much as 8mm of soot encrustation. An unusual feature was the later insertion of a squint, or more likely a vent, in what might be interpreted as the dais truss. It is a wide strut between tiebeam and collar and is pierced with a pair of chamfered slots, the heads of which rise symmetrically to form a pointed head. If the dais truss has been correctly identified, then the dated timbers relate to a rebuilt solar end with a divided service below, all of 1573. The Wellington & Drayton was a double track line. It was not a great commercial success as far as passenger traffic went, and was mainly used for freight. It was closed to passengers in 1963 and completely in 1967. <2>

In September 2013, a programme of archaeological evaluation was carried out on land north of the Muller Dairy, Market Drayton, Shropshire. Trench 13a was excavated on the former line of the railway, visible as an earthwork cutting. At the southern end of the trench, the railway cutting itself and the remains of associated revetting walls or drains, (1313) and (1317), were located. The southernmost of these (1317) was located in a 2.80m wide cut, backfilled with a mixture of clinker and soil layers (1312), (1319), (1314) and (1315). The structure appeared to have been badly truncated during the removal of the railway line, but was constructed from roughly cuboid worked stones. The northern structure was similarly constructed, from roughly shaped cuboid sandstone blocks (1313), and lay within a linear ditch [1318] orientated on a NE – SW alignment. Abutting these blocks and backfilling the trench was a fill consisting of light brown silty sand and clinker (1319).

-> These structural remains could be interpreted in a number of ways. Considering their depth, and their position in a cut, it seems probable that these are

drainage features designed to take away accumulated water in the railway cutting. However, there is the possibility that they represent the remains of revetting walls associated with either supporting the track bed itself or the edges of the cutting. The track bed was heavily disturbed, but enough remained to suggest the bedding material used was a layer of compacted clinker and coal dust material (1314). The top of the backfilled railway bed was located 0.6m below the field surface, and the base of the railway bed was at 1.1m below ground level. <3>

Linear cropmarks of the dismantled GWR at Crudgington were photographed during aerial survey in 2009. <4>
